

The Duchy of Schleswig at the end of the 17th century






The Kingdom of Denmark c.1625




The Kingdom of Denmark in the late 17th century








Fehmarn Off the coast of Holstein But part of Schleswig






Ribe Within the Danish Kingdom But part of Schleswig





Aerø Off the coast of Denmark But part of Schleswig







Border rates were agreed in a postal convention of 1860 and reported in Circular No. 3 of 1861 (21st January, paragraph 5b).

Mecklenburg offices were Schönburg, Rehna, Gadebusch, Wittenburg, Brahlstorf and Boizenburg, and Lauenburg offices were Büchen, Schwarzenbeck, Mölln, Friedrichsruhe and Reinbeck.

The rate was 1 Sgr. = 4 Skilling = 11/4

Consequences of the War

Mail redirected via Sweden

Circular 4/1864 stated that mail routed via Sweden could be carried with 4 Skilling added to the usual rate. The usual rate to England, plus 4 Skilling. was 34 Skilling.




"Two Wars" Cover

31st January 1864, Unpaid envelope sent from NORBORG on the island of Als to San Francisco, California via AABENRAA 1st, HAMBURG 9th, AACHEN 10th, NEW YORK 29th February.



Charged 4- Silbergroschen (= I O¢) to Aachen, (2 due to Denmark and two to the German Austrian Postal Union), 20¢ to New York, 5¢ to California, making 35¢. in all. Equal to 54¢ in depreciated US currency.

The Ribe Post Office







The Ribe post office was operated by the Prussian administration in Schleswig from 14th July until 14th October 1864 with a Prussian two ring cds canceller using the German name Ripen. The Danish Post Office was re-established on 1st October 1864.

Border Rate

The Postal agreement of August 1865 (Circular 11/1865) introduced a border postal rote of I ¼ Schilling between Kolding, Skodborghus and Ribe on the Danish side and Christiansfeld, Hadersleben, Lügumkloster, and Tondern on the other.

The Danish post office in Lübeck closed on 31st April 1868 leaving no Danish postal service in the Duchies and Hanseatic Cities south of the River Eider for the first time since 1624.
